Vaccine Mandate for Volunteers, External Individuals and External Organizations

Effective Oct. 25, 2021, all volunteers, external individuals and external organizations, engaging in EIPS-related activities and working directly with students or EIPS staff, must present proof of full vaccination, or a negative COVID-19 test result before entering a Division facility. The negative COVID-19 test must be a privately paid COVID-19 PCR or rapid test—approved by Health Canada—and

completed within 72 hours. EIPS does not accept test results from Alberta Health Services or Alberta Precision Laboratories.

EIPS staff shall refuse admittance into a Division facility to persons who do not provide the required proof or documentation.

From EIPS - Inclement Weather

With the winter season almost here, we want to remind families to dress children appropriately for the weather when getting ready for school or the bus. The weather often changes unexpectedly throughout the day, so please select suitable outerwear and ensure your child is prepared for changing conditions.

If inclement weather conditions occur, Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) advises families of any bus cancellations using various communications tools, which may include automated-telephone messages, alerts posted on www.eips.ca and school websites, through the Bus Status app, Twitter, Facebook and on Versatrans My Stop. Morning bus cancellations are posted on www.eips.ca by 5:30 a.m. or the night prior if conditions make it obvious bus service will be cancelled the next day.

Decisions regarding bus cancellations are guided by EIPS administrative procedures that states, "school bus service may be suspended…when Environment Canada reports a temperature of -40 C." Other reasons for suspending or delaying school bus services include adverse weather and poor road conditions. When school bus services are suspended, schools remain open to students. EIPS believes families have the right and responsibility to make choices for their children based on their beliefs and perceptions of safety during times of inclement weather.

No Child Without: Free MedicAlert for students

In our ongoing effort to provide safe and caring schools for students, Fort Saskatchewan Elementary School is registered in the Canadian MedicAlert Foundation's No Child Without program. The program is a national initiative that provides no-cost MedicAlert services to children—between the ages of four and 14 years—who have chronic health conditions. The goal is twofold: to help children with severe allergies, medical conditions or special needs and to assist schools with medical-emergency plans for students.

Once a child is registered, the school is provided with advice on a medical-emergency plan for that student and given a list of medications, allergies and medical conditions the student has. If your child has a serious medical condition or allergy and could benefit from MedicAlert services, contact the school office at 780-998-7771. Literacy Tip

Literacy at Home: The Importance of Vocabulary

Parents often ask for tips on working with their children at home to build literacy skills. Daniel Willingham, a psychology professor at the University of Virginia who writes about the science behind reading comprehension, explained that whether or not readers understand a text has a lot to do with how much background knowledge and vocabulary they have relating to the topic. That's because writers leave out a lot of information that they assume readers will know.

In fact, a study by Nagy & Herman showed the following results:

Student A reads 1 minute each day in a school year

Student B reads 5 minutes each day in a school year

Learns 282 000 new words

Learns 282 000 new words

Learns 1 800 000 new words

So, what can you do at home? Here are some ideas:

- Read with and to your child for 20 minutes each day.
- Have conversations with your child and try to include "big words" and new words.
- Tell stories to your child and encourage them to ask questions.
- Involve your child in the activities you do

 cooking, fixing the car, etc. Use terms
 specific to the activity to build
 vocabulary.
